Thanks very much to the volunteers who helped out with the Fenland Camtad equipment clinic while the regular volunteer was away and to Roger Pepper who helped out at sensory services when Mike was on holiday.

We have produced a guidance note for clinic receptionists as sometimes people have to take over reception when the regular receptionist is away and it helps to have clear steps to follow. These will be kept with the book so anyone can see what needs to be done and Fran and Mike will be making sure these are all in the clinics over the next month.

We have a new switchboard as BT would no longer maintain our old one. I know that the old answering machine was a bit of a problem and I hope this arrangement works better.

The new switchboard

will ring for 7 rings before the answering machine picks up, so please hold on for it.

I attended the Disability Planning Consultative Panel to see the new plans for the Grafton Centre in Cambridge, which have now been passed by the planning committee.



I was able to comment on how poor the acoustics are in the centre, and that anyone who stays for any length of time feels deafened when, for example, providing information at a stall.

The new entrance will be more open plan, so I am not sure it will improve the sound quality, but the refurbishment provides an opportunity for this to be considered.

The RNID reports that it is now working with the Ministry of Defence on reducing noise-induced hearing loss in troops in Iraq and Afghanistan. It is a bit depressing that this is only happening now, when the consequences to soldiers from battle

noises and explosions have been known for generations. I remember that my father's contemporaries all seemed to be a more or less deaf from their war-time experiences.

Studies in America have linked hearing loss to the high rate of suicide amongst veterans; noise-induced hearing loss, tinnitus, and hearing damage, marked by ringing in the ears, are two of the top disability claims for soldiers. These are on the increase, it is thought due to the nature of the barrage of explosions and gunbattles in tight spaces and urban areas in Iraq.

The Americans now have hearing loss prevention as a top priority and have ordered thousands of ear-plugs to fit every conceivable ear and situation and have an aggressive campaign to educate soldiers about noise-induced hearing loss and the importance of prevention.


I hope that our own military experts take the issue as seriously to prevent the avoidable damage caused to the quality of life of our troops through hearing loss.

Noise Action Week (18th-22nd May) is an annual initiative coordinated by Environmental Protection UK (formerly NSCA), that aims to raise awareness of the problems caused by neighbour noise and the solutions available to tackle it.

It provides an opportunity for local authorities, housing providers, mediation services and all those involved in neighbour noise management to raise

awareness of services available and promote practical solutions.



During Noise Action Week, hundreds of organisations involved in managing noise across the UK, including local authority noise, housing, health teams, antisocial behaviour teams, housing organisations, mediation services, schools and others, coordinate events

at local level to educate and inform people about noise, the impact it has and how to reduce it.

RNID NEWS

At the beginning of 2008 the Department of Health unveiled an exciting plan to fund anew, national hearing research unit to help move scientific discoveries closer to bringing benefit to people with hearing loss or tinnitus.

The national Biomedical research Unit in Hearing, to be set up in Nottingham, will involve researchers from the Medical Research Council's



Institute of Hearing Research, the University of Nottingham, and Nottingham University Hospitals trust. The unit, which should be completed this spring, will receive funding of £3.75m over four years and will employ around 25 researchers and support staff.

Most research into the causes and treatment of hearing loss has so far focused on the cochlea, as this is the most common

common site of damage. The new unit in Nottingham is taking a very different approach.

Increasingly, it is becoming clear that cognitive processes like attention, memory and learning play an important role in helping us understand what we hear. The researchers in Nottingham believe that by designing specific auditory training exercises they can help people get the most out of their hearing (be it natural or aided). The research will focus on three groups of children aged under five, older people with sensorineural hearing loss and, finally, people with tinnitus.

Ensuring that the research really does benefit people with hearing problems will be vital to the unit's success. That is why the scientists will be working closely with the people they are trying to help. RNID has been invited onto the unit's management board and is in regular contact with the researchers.

Over 60 MPs have signed an Early Day Motion (EDM) in support of RNID's Read My Lips campaign. MPs sign an EDM to show their support for a particular issue. The more signatures an EDM attracts, the easier it is to prove to Ministers the strength of opinion in Parliament about a particular topic.

The EDM calls on the Government to review its policy and guidance to local authorities. It asks the Government to enforce common standards of provision around the UK and to ensure that costs are minimised so no groups of deaf or hard of hearing people are excluded from learning lipreading.

The RNID are campaigning for lipreading classes to be provided at little or no cost to the learner. In the past few months their lipreading campaign has been putting pressure on local authorities to provide access to classes for people who are deaf or hard of hearing
